# A Message from the Principal

Student progress during the 2012-2013 school year gave us reason to celebrate and areas to increase our focus and support. Overall the data was good and the progress in many areas was great! Here is a summary of our state test results.

#### **Celebrations:**

69% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students either reached benchmark or met their individual growth goal on the spring district test. 83% of 4<sup>th</sup> grade students either reached benchmark or met their individual growth goal on the spring district test. Over 73% of our fifth graders passed the state test.

77% of 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students either reached benchmark or met their individual growth goal on the spring district test. 91% of 4<sup>th</sup> grade students either reached benchmark or met their individual growth goal on the spring state test. Over 70% of our fourth graders passed the district test.

#### **Areas of Focus:**

3<sup>rd</sup> grade will focus on comprehension and analysis of text.

4th grade will focus on analysis of text and informational text.

5<sup>th</sup> grade will focus on the literary component of the state test.

Grades 3-5 will focus on developing problem solving/reasoning skills.

We have new math materials this year and instruction is shifting to follow the framework of the Common Core State Standards. We are making some changes to our reading instruction with a greater focus on small group support so that all students get feedback every day. Academic accomplishment is our number one goal. We achieve this with high quality teaching, responsive interventions and a strong school culture that supports the success of all students. We are very proud of our school community and its focus on a culture of hope. *Kids at Hope* is our cultural framework and it keeps our focus on what matters, making sure that all students are successful, no exceptions.

#### **Educational Goals for 2013-2014**

As part of our school improvement plan, we have developed building goals and detailed action strategies in four areas: Math, Reading, Graduation Rate and Family Involvement. Each grade level has also developed short-term goals based on student assessment data. Every four to six weeks those goals may be revised based on student test results. You are encouraged to contact your child's teacher to learn more about these and individual goals for your child.

#### 2012-2013 State Test Results

There are many celebrations and some challenges that were evident when we examined the state testing data from the spring 2013 MSP. When reviewing student growth, it is important to compare the progress that groups of students made. While significant improvements were made in the area of reading for our 3<sup>rd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students, our 4<sup>th</sup> graders passed at a much lower rate. After staff review and planning, our school wide improvement plan (S.I.P.) was developed. This plan will help guide our focus on our instructional efforts and you may request a copy any time by contacting the main office. ## **Facility Information**

Christensen Elementary opened in 1959. It was named after Andrew C. Christensen, Sr., descendant of a pioneer Parkland family and a member of the school board from 1935 - 1955.

In the 1960's two small covered play areas were enclosed to create a library and what now houses special education classes. The 600 building was completed in the fall of 1992. The Franklin Pierce Building Trades Class constructed the music building which opened in the fall of 1997. The last remodel was completed in 2000.

# **School-wide Title One Program**

Our school receives federal funding from what is commonly known as Title One. These funds are dedicated to support students who receive additional instruction both in and out of the classroom from certificated and classified teaching staff. Through the school improvement planning process a committee of staff and parents is formed to determine how we can best use these funds. This committee of representatives monitor the S.I.P. plan and its implementation throughout the year. Our teachers receive ongoing training from our instructional coach and are supported by district sponsored training. # **Highly Qualified Staff**

# Cougar Club

Christensen has an after-school program made possible by a 21st Century Learning Community Centers Grant. The grant program supports the creation of community learning centers that provide academic support opportunities during after school hours for children. The program helps students meet state and district standards in core academic subjects, such as reading & math. It also offers students a broad array of enrichment activities that can complement their regular academic programs. Students provided additional time to complete school work; focusing on math, reading and writing skills. An hour of enrichment activities are also part of the program. The staff includes one full time person and several teachers, along with many volunteers. The 5-year program is in its fourth school year.

# Looping

All teachers at Christensen stay or "loop" with their classes for two years. We have a kindergarten to first grade loop, second grade to third grade loop and a fourth grade to fifth grade loop. This allows teachers to maintain strong connections with students and families over these two years.

## **Parents and Community**

During the spring of 2013, we conducted a survey and 112 parents and community members responded. The following were the results: over 90% felt Christensen is a safe school. Over 93% said that their child was being supported very well. 94% said that the staff to parent interactions were very positive, and over 95% felt that the overall experience was very positive for them and their child(ren)!

## **Kids at Hope**

Research is clear that a strong school culture is key to students' success. Our framework for creating a culture of success is *Kids at Hope*. At Christensen we are committed to this simple idea, "All Students are Capable of Success, No Exceptions!" We believe that the success of every student in our school is related to the hope they have for their future. Kids at Hope is a way of looking at each student's strengths and building on them. Rather than seeing students as "at risk" we see them as "at hope". Success for all students begins when caring adults believe in and connect with students.


